We are very excited to invite you to an official "grand opening" event on Saturday, April 26th, 3 to 5 p.m. at the Solana Beach Post Office, 153 S. Sierra Ave. Mayor Lesa Heebner, City Council members, Postmaster Richard Zamora and artist Kevin Anderson will join us to snip a ribbon and formally

dedicate nine new murals adorning the interior walls.

Your Board of Directors voted to commission the murals after the Post Office interior was repainted. As you know, for more than 70 years, our organization's mission has been to support civic education and the beautification of our community, so the freshly painted walls provided a canvas for furthering those goals.

After Postmaster Richard Zamora agreed to partner on the project, Kevin was the obvious artist for the job. He is a Solana Beach native whose works already are prominent throughout San Diego County and Southern California, including at the Gateway Business Center at the northwest corner of I-5 and Lomas Santa Fe Drive.

Together, we chose a selection of iconic Solana Beach sites for the paintings. Kevin knows them all, having grown up on Glenmont Drive and as a regular among the surfers at Pillbox, aka Fletcher Cove. The scenes include beach and bluff-side views, as well as underwater sea-life based on Kevin's memories of his many hours in the ocean. There also are depictions of Fletcher Cove Park, the downtown Plaza area, and this montage of images honoring the city's founding neighborhood of La Colonia de Eden Gardens.

We'll offer refreshments and snacks, as

well as tours by our SeaWeeders, whose volunteers keep the sculpture garden thriving.

Trash Talk with EDCO -- Learn How to Recycle Right

Confused about what goes into which bin? Wondering how to take the "ick" factor out of storing organic kitchen waste? You're not alone! Get answers to your household trash head-scratchers -- and learn how EDCO has adapted to changing market demand for recycled materials.

At our April 10 general meeting, Logan Betz, EDCO Account Representative for Solana Beach, will provide an overview of the family-owned company, founded in 1967, and its nearly 60-year commitment to recycling innovations. These include the state-of-the-art Anaerobic Digester facility in Escondido that turns your green and organic waste into mulch, compost and liquid fertilizer.

Organic waste includes food scraps, food-soiled paper and cardboard boxes (such as those used for take-out meals), as well as landscape trimmings and grass. "Anaerobic digestion" (AD) happens in huge, closed tanks deprived of oxygen. Microbial breakdown heats your green-bin yard and food waste to



131 degrees. Inside the tank, giant stirrers constantly agitate the decaying matter to speed processing.

The methane gas produced during "digestion" is contained and converted onsite at the EDCO facility into Renewable Natural Gas (RNG), which



into Renewable Natural Gas (RNG), which EDCO uses to fuel its more than 200-truck fleet.

The first Escondido AD opened in 2021 and operates around the clock, processing 1.5 million pounds of green yard and organic waste daily. In fact, the digester needs constant "feeding" or the microbes die off and the decomposition process fails. A second digester now is operational and two more are being constructed on site. When completed, EDCO says the AD plants will be able to handle all of the food waste generated in North County and most of the rest of the region.

EDCO also processes recyclable materials at its Escondido plant — one of five it operates in

the county. In the 70,000-square-foot Escondido Resource Recovery (ERR) facility, your blue-bin contents get fed into labyrinth of varied conveyer and magnetic belts — and past a small army of human sorters. Recyclables such as plastic bottles and containers, cans and paper are separated, processed and baled (aluminum, paper, plastics and tin) or crushed (glass) and then sold for repurposing. Clear milk jugs can be turned into colored plastic containers. Stiffer, colored plastic jugs might become paint containers or plastic pipe. Aluminum cans become cans again. Baled paper is processed into pulp. The company estimates that its ERR facility keeps 250,000 tons of recyclables out of landfills yearly.

EDCO reports that 95% of its recyclable plastics are made into new products by U.S. companies; only 5% now are shipped overseas. Before 2018, nearly 60% of recyclable materials generated in California were exported to China and other Asian markets, but that year China said it would no longer accept 26 types of recyclable materials due to contamination by non-recyclable debris. Processing mills worldwide now demand that recycling facilities ship only materials with less than 1% contamination.

Trash Talk, continued. . .

One of the most common contaminants are plastic bags, so it's important to keep *all* plastic bags -- trash bags, grocery bags, storage bags, etc. -- out of both your blue and your green bins. Those so-called "compostable" bags are a no-no, too. Betz will explain why and provide examples of better alternatives for storing kitchen scraps -- including a free Kitchen Caddie you can order from EDCO. We'll have samples on hand! Also:

- Remove stickers, labels and plastic packaging from produce.
- Take off twist ties and rubber bands from vegetables; those go in the gray trash bin.
- Put food-soiled cardboard (e.g., pizza boxes) and paper in the green bin.
- Make sure cans, bottles, jars and plastic containers are empty before tossing into your blue bin.
- Never toss household hazardous waste (HHW) into ANY EDCO collection bin. <u>Learn how to handle</u> HHW here.

CARTON CONTAINERS:

Aseptic cartons, including milk cartons and juice boxes, halfgallon juice cartons, soup/broth cartons, and wine cartons.




MIXED PAPER:

Mixed paper, including junk mail, catalogs, telephone books, magazines, newspaper, and paper used for computer printing.



STYROFOAM:

Clean foam cups, meat trays, plates, egg cartons, block packaging, rigid polystyrene, and carry-out containers.





These items go inside EDCO's blue commingled recycling carts!



ALUMINUM:

SHREDDED PAPER:

Shredded paper (placed in

a clear bag is okay for easy

identifying).

Clean aluminum foil, clean aluminum trays, and pie tins.



GLASS CONTAINERS:

Glass containers including food jars and beverage bottles.



PAPERBOARD:

Paperboard boxes such as cereal boxes, tissue boxes, refrigerated food boxes, boxes from toiletries, and soda/ beer cases.



Aluminum, steel & tin cans, such as food and beverage cans for soda, soup, beer, beans, fruit, and vegetables.

*All food and beverage containers should be EMPTY: no/minimal food residue and no liquids remaining.



CARDBOARD:

Cardboard, including boxes used for moving and shipping or any other box or packaging made of corrugated cardboard.



#1 - #7 PLASTICS:

All plastic containers, lids, and packaging with a recycling symbol of #1-7 (all containers accepted with caps and lids): water and soda bottles, peanut butter and other food jars, mouthwash bottles, vegetable oil containers, ovenable food trays, milk jugs, juice bottles, shampoo and conditioner bottles, detergent & bleach containers, condiment bottles, medicine bottles, bottle caps, butter and yogurt tubs, CD cases, baby bottles, 3-gallon water bottles, CDs, medical storage containers, and rigid plastics such as 5-gallon buckets.
